PRESIDENT'S REPORT.. Well members the season is underway with patrols starting, gear inspection completed and membership forms and fees due again.

Thanks to all of you who have decided to tie on the red and yellow quartered caps again. Wear them with PRIDE.

You have by now received your membership forms along with the "Volunteer/Student declaration" form that is required to be filled out, signed and returned to the Registrar. In the past this has not been happening, with the document being returned, not being fully completed.

I'm sorry, but if you do not fill-in and sign the declaration you cannot join a surf club here, of anywhere else in Australia.. it is your responsibility and we cannot accept your membership without it.

We have made the following point before, regarding membership fees. Our club has a very modest fee structure compared to other clubs. Many are charging in excess of \$130--150 per season which does not include competition fees which can be \$200 to \$250+, and gym fees (if they have a gymnasium) of up to \$150 to \$200 per season....this on top of, in some cases, completing 50 hours of patrols

Your willingness to again front up for patrols is admired by many in our wider community. Recently I was asked to speak to the local Rotary club and the depth of feeling there towards you and our club was one of deep gratitude for the service we provide.

At the recent Branch Presentation night it was announced that after 16 years Integral Energy have decided not to sponsor the Branch. They have been a major sponsor and their withdrawal will put a serious dent in Branch finances. It is likely that Bluescope steel is also looking at their position as well. Some clubs ask members to part with fees much greater than ours. You may have been interested to read above of the Fees for a smaller Sydney club. Others charge much higher than these.

However this can't continue much longer unless members are willing to help out. The President's pleas for help with raffles has gone unheeded, as has pleas to help on the Annual door knock and in the BBQ van. If the President closes down the raffles for want of assistance then members can expect a probable hefty increase in fees next season. It is the raffle money which subsidises all our insurances, and helps to provide the equipment so necessary for patrol work. So give it some thought. Coolum Surf Club "are at war over the government's proposed poker machine reforms, which could leave their club with a \$720,000 black hole and budget cuts to crucial rescue equipment.

Ian Swan--who sits on the Coolum Surf Club board--said yesterday small clubs such as his would be in the firing line. His club has 48 poker machines....we rely on that money coming in to help pay for the equipment (such as) IRB's, utes and trailers!"

Surely, with 48 poker machines, and even with the costs of the reforms, a 'small ' surf club like Coolum could still function successfully. How much do they need ??

beach began to erode,
Tweed Shire spent

A month later, the emergency
works washed away.

Then, at a cost of \$140,000, sandbags were laid to protect the surf club. Next, a 70m-long double wall of sandbags, costing \$255,000, was installed in front of the caravan park. But the tides kept rising. The rate at which the foreshore was disappearing peaked at 15m in a single day.

In total, a 100m stretch of beach, road, trees, gardens, parkland and caravan park property has collapsed into the ocean. A real mess. Kingscliff needs help.

RESCUE..... RESCUE....... RESCUE 1111 Last month one of Sydney's iconic events celebrated its 40th birthday. This was the running of the City to Surf Fun Run, an annual event which is now rated as the largest event of its kind held anywhere in the World.

The first run was held on the 5th September 1971 with many thousands competing and a large crowd of spectators waiting at the finish line at Bondi. BUT, they got more than they bargained for as the following article shows us. They witnessed a dramatic, but ultimately unsuccessful rescue, where members of the Bondi Icebergs Club, including many past and current members of the two Bondi Surf clubs, took part.



September 5, 1971, will go down in history as the day Bondi Icebergs Club made history and became the first club ever to receive the Certificate of Merit of the Royal Humane Society of NSW for a gallant rescue in which many members took part.

The unique honour followed the dramatic rescue of a woman parachutist, Mrs Pattie King, 27, of Cremorne.

The desperate struggle to save the young woman, in which many members of Bondi Icebergs Club took part, was watched by more than 10,000 people who had gathered at Bondi beach to watch the finish of the first City-to-Surf footrace.

During the drama enacted off Bondi beach, Mrs King was under water for about 20 minutes, tangled in her parachute lines and at another stage of the rescue she was dragged away from her rescuers and disappeared in the surf.

Mrs King's husband, Colin King, who was supervising safety procedure from the beach, watched his wife fall into the surf in horror, and the desperate attempts to rescue her.

Mrs King was one of 10 Australian Parachute Federation members who were to make a free-fall jump from 10,000 ft and land on the beach.

The parachutists opened their chutes at 2,000 ft, but a sudden drop in the wind caused three of them to fall

Mrs King, who had previously made more than 360 descents, hit the water only five yards from MacKenzie Point, South Bondi, where 12 ft waves were breaking onto the rocks.

Mr Bob Treanor, a fireman, and Mr Ernie Scruse, a policeman, were lined up with other Bondi Icebergs ready to start a race in the baths at 10.45 am. They immediately dived in to help the woman in distress.

The two Icebergs reached Mrs King, but could not keep her head above the water, and with each wave she became more entangled with the parachute lines.

The water filled her parachute and although she was wearing flotation gear, each wave dragged her under.

Mr Kevin Doohan, of Fletcher St, Bondi, tried to

take out a belt and line from a reel near the point but the line proved to be 20 yards short.

The 17ft fibreglass Waverley power rescue boat had been delayed because it had first picked up Mr Ian Swinbourne, of McMahons Point, who had parachuted into the water half a mile out to sea.

He said later that he had collided with Mrs King's parachute when his own opened at 2,000 feet.

There were a couple of twists in the lines, and when they straightened out, he had veered sharply into Mrs King's suspension lines, just below the edge of the

To stop himself going through the lines and getting entangled, he spreadeagled his arms and legs.

Swinbourne bounced off the taut lines, but one flicked his reserve parachute ripcord and he floated down with two parachutes, unable to steer.

One of the other parachutists, Mr Geoff Bingham, of Mitchell St, McMahons Point, landed on McKenzie beach. He immediately released his gear and dived into the sea to help Mrs King.

By this time the power rescue boat had got to within 10 yards of the drowning woman and her supporters.

A crewman dived in with a line and tied it to the chute, hoping to tow her away from the rocks, but a huge wave washed over the boat, washing another of the crew overboard.

The parachute, like a giant sea-anchor, dragged the stern of the boat down and the next wave flipped it over backwards, throwing the driver and Mr Swinbourne into the surf.

The boat was smashed on the rocks.

Mr Treanor told the Sydney Morning Herald, "When the big wave that overturned the boat hit the chute we couldn't hold the woman. She was dragged out of our

hands and we couldn't see her in all that white water."

A rip known to locals as the "bogey" carried Mrs
King opposite Bondi Baths where a man glimpsed her
hand in the surf and about 15 men jumped into the water to help her.

One, Mr Neil Smith, of Waverley, had been directing the rescue from the beach by two-way radio. The men fought desperately to keep Mrs King up, but her parachute and sodden equipment were too heavy.

"She kept sinking, so the only thing we could do was to grab the parachute and drag her along the bottom to the beach," Mr Smith said.

He added: "We just couldn't pull her up and she was underwater for about 20 minutes. It took a long time because it is rocky there and she kept snagging on the

Resusitation equipment was rushed to the beach from the Prince of Wales Hospital. Dr Terry Tydd of the Prince of Wales Hospital, Dr James Smith of Randwick, and Dr T. Kraemer, of Bondi, took turns in giving Mrs King closed chest massage and other cardiac treatment.

Oxygen was administered continuously in the ambulance on the way to hospital.

The jump master and State Secretary of the Parachute Federation, Mr Ted Harrison, 34, of Glebe, who was one of the parachutists, said two wind indicators dropped head revealed that the jump should be made about 100 yards south-east of MacKenzie Point, if the parachutists were to land opposite Bondi Pavilion. To stop them overshooting and crashing into the crowd, he said, he added a safety margin of 200

But in the 10 minutes it took the aircraft to climb from 2,000 to 10,000 ft, there had been a brief lull in

the wind.

"We were expecting the wind to increase and not drop," he said.

Mr Harrison said he was so confident of landing on the said.

Mr Harrison said he was so confident of landing on the said. the beach that he jumped with a \$700 motor-driven camera which was ruined when he landed in the sea.

Others injured included the driver of the rescue boat, Mr Paul Hoolahan, of Bronte, who was taken to Eastern Suburbs Hospital suffering from concussion but was later allowed to leave. Another crewman, Mr Paul Meehan, of Bondi, was taken to St Vincent's Hospital, where he was treated for cuts, shock and immersion and was allowed to go home.

Mrs King died four days later in hospital.

Congratulations poured into the Icebergs Club for its major role in the rescue of Mrs King.

Signed by the mayor, Ald Doug Morey and the Town Clerk, the club received a letter under seal of Waverley Council, which stated:

Hon. Secretary Bondi Icebergs Club, 25th August, 1972

Dear Mr Gow, The aldermen of the Council of the Municipality of Waverley, at the ordinary meeting of Council held on Tuesday evening last, 22nd August, 1972, noted with appreciation the information forwarded by the Royal Humane Society of New South Wales, that it intends to issue a Group Certificate of Merit to the Bondi Icebergs' Club, following upon the courageous actions of many members who took part in the rescue operations following upon the tragic sequel of the organised parachute descent which was held on the occasion of the City-to-Surf race on 5th September, 1971.

The Council feels that the award made by the Royal Humane Society has not only brought honour to the members concerned and to the Bondi Icebergs'

Club but to the Municipality of Waverley.

Authorised by Resolution of Council of the 22nd August, 1972." Signed Mayor and Town Clerk.

The Council seal was affixed to the letter, and on it was overwritten "The Council's seal was affixed hereto to conform with the Resolution above noted."

The Royal Humane Society Certificate which with Council's letter, and a citation and photographs of the Governor of NSW, Sir Roden Cutler, presenting the award to club members is now framed and hangs proudly in the clubhouse.

The Certificate of Merit states:

The Royal Humane Society of New South Wales.

"This Certificate of Merit has been awarded to members of Bondi Icebergs' Club for bravery on 5th September, 1971." Signed (Sir) Adrian Curlewis, President.

The citation in the frame, states:-

"On September 5, 1971, shortly after 10.40 a.m., Mrs Patricia King, a member of the Australian Parachutist Federation, while taking part in a parachute jumping and free-fall display, fell into the ocean off MacKenzie Point, when she failed to reach the nearby appointed landing position on Bondi Beach. Hampered by both her main and emergency parachutes and a heavy easterly swell, she began to drift towards a bombora off the rocks south of Bondi Baths.

"Bingham, who landed safely, discarded his parachute equipment and swam out to her assistance, where he was joined by Maidment. The two men tried to support Mrs King, who was hampered not only by two parachutes but also by her jump suit, boots and helmet, although wearing a partly-inflated 'Mae West'

jacket.

Scruse and Treanor, then reached them and made unsuccessful attempts to release the parachute harness. By this time the five of them had been carried into the Bombora and as large waves pounded them, the men several times lost their hold on Mrs King.

'At this stage, Messrs Meehan, Fatoupolis, Hoolahan and Greenwood, members of the Bondi jet-rescue boat, together with another rescued parachutist Ian Swinbourne, reached the group. Meehan and Fatoupolis tried to fasten a line from the boat to Mrs King's parachute in an effort to drag her away from the

"The attempt failed when the boat was washed onto the rocks. It's occupants were thrown into the water and were in danger of drowning, particularly Hoolahan,

who had a head injury.
"Members of the Bondi Icebergs' Club got Hoolahan, Fatoupolis, Greenwood and Swinbourne out of the water on to the rocks. Scruse and Meehan were picked up in a police launch. Meanwhile some other members of the Bondi Icebergs' Club tried to pull Mrs King to safety by using her parachut lines, but continuous high waves swept her out of sight. Later, Mrs King was sighted near Bondi Baths and members of the Bondi Icebergs' Club succeeded in getting her to the beach.

She died four days later in hospital.

Despite the sorrow at the passing of the plucky woman parachutist, the rescue operations added a thrilling and dramatic chapter in the annals of Bondi Icebergs' Club.

The City to Surf Race became an annual event for members of our club with members competing each year for almost the first twenty years. It was always trained for and members looked forward to the incredible experience of competing. Maybe we could revise this tradition if there was interest? Let us know. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

IF ONLY OUR 'ICONIC' BRONZE MEDALLION
COULD TALK ...IT WOULD TELL THE STORY

OF FRANK NORTON ...Frank passed away earlier this year after being a member of Bronte since 1937. He was Club Captain, then President from 1954 to 1969 and Patron from 1970 until 2011. he was elected a Life Member in 1952 and Life Governor of the club this year. Frank represented many of the members of surf lifesaving clubs who spent much of their youth fighting in WWII. In May 1943 Frank and his mates of 6

Machine Gun Battalion were camped at Kembla Grange on the south coast. With little warning they were loaded on trucks and driven to Bass Point, south of Shellharbour. There they found a ship, the tanker <u>US Cities Service Boston</u>.

which had crashed on rocks in a raging storm.

Ropes were secured to the ship and, using a bosun's chair 62 crew members were rescued. Unfortunately as the last man was being brought ashore, a huge wave washed four of the rescuers into the water and they were drowned--the only casualties of the accident.

For his part Frank Norton received a citation from his battalion and a Letter of Commendation from the US War Shipping Administration. Rescuing people from the surf was to play a major part in his life. Frank Norton went on to see service in New Guinea in 1943 and 1944; and in Borneo at Tarakan and Balikpapan in 1945.

# "THE OUESTION....OFTEN ASKED.... 'HOW WILL YOU PERFORM WHEN PLACED ON THE SPOT!' ???"

This was certainly the last thing on the mind of club member Neil Blair recently when he went for a late afternoon game of golf at Mollymook Hilltop course. Limbering up on the practice tee he was "placed on the spot" when an elderly golfer alongside him on the practice tee collapsed. Neil now had to put all his surf club training into practice as he carried out his first CPR.

He immediately commenced CPR while getting another by-stander to call 000, continuing to apply compressions for nearly 30 minutes until the ambulance

paramedics arrived.

Subsequently the patient was air-lifted by helicopter to Sydney, where

unfortunately he passed away.

Neil did a great job and he and the ambulance personnel gave the man every chance, but to no avail.

Congratulations Neil on a job "well-done".

# TO ALL CLUB MEMBERS ... RE STANDARD PROCEDURE INSTRUCTIONS IN CASE OF DEATH OF PATROL MEMBERS.

It has recently been brought to the attention of Mollymook SLSC that many patrol members have been dying while on duty for apparently no good reason at all; furthermore, the same patrol members are refusing to fall over after they are dead.

Where it can be proved that the patrol member is being held up by the rhino, the side of the patrol trailer, a patrol flag pole or the IRB, a ninety day period of grace will be granted.

The following procedure will be henceforth, from the start of the 2011/12 season strictly adhered to.....

If, after several hours, it is noticed that the patrol member has not moved or changed position, the Patrol Captain or Patrol Vice Captain will investigate. Because of the highly sensitive nature of our patrol members and the close resemblance between death and their natural patrolling attitude, the investigation will be made quietly so as to prevent waking the patrol member if they have just fallen asleep. If some doubt as to their true condition is felt, the extending of a box of hot beach but chips is a fine test. If the patrol member does not immediately grasp a handful of said chips, then it may be reasonably assumed that they are dead.

NOTE: In some cases the instinct to "extend" the hand for the hot, beach hut chips is so strongly developed that a spasmodic "Clutcher Reflex" action may occur even after death!

In all cases a sworn statement by the dead person must be filled out on a special form provided for the purpose in the patrol book.

### Amoeba deaths

WASHINGTON: Three young Americans have died this year from a rare brain infection caused by waterborne amoeba, a one-celled organism that swims up through the nose.

The Centres for Disease Control in the US said a 16-year-old died of the infection earlier this month after an outdoor swim in Florida, and a nineyear-old died in Virginia after a summer fishing camp. In June, a 20-year-old in Louisiana was infected by a contaminated nasal allergy spray.

An amoeba is found in warm freshwater lakes, rivers and occasionally in poorly treated swimming pools.

## Piranhas' surf attack

RIO DE JANEIRO: In a scene that could be straight from a horror movie, hordes of hungry piranhas have attacked 100 swimmers at a beach in Brazil's northeast.

Authorities in Piaui state said yesterday a lack of predators meant fish numbers had grown out of control.

At least 100 bathers had to be treated at hospital in Jose de Freitas after being bitten on the heels or toes at the local beach last weekend.

"As they have no predators, piranhas have begun attacking people on the beach," official Romildo Mafra said.

## Fish batter swimmers

LONDON: Britons are experiencing a heatwave with a bit of bite as more than 1000 holidaymakers have stung by a poisonous fish.

Scientists have found that numbers of the weever - the country's most venomous fish are on the increase.

Weevers have always been a hazard on the country's southwest coast, but this year people have been stung as far afield as Hastings on the south coast and North Yorkshire. Marine experts blame the cases on warmer sea temperatures.

# Shark

CAPE TOWN: A British man deliberately ignored warnings and signs that a great white shark had been spotted off a beach before he had his legs bitten off while swimming in South Africa yesterday. The man, named as Michael

Cohen, is in a critical condition after he was attacked while swimming, despite warnings the shark was circling close to the beach in Cape Town.
The 43-year-old is said to

have swum regularly at Fish Hoek beach, notorious for great white sightings, even telling fellow beachgoers: "If a shark takes me, then blame me, not the shark."

Witnesses said he parked his car and walked right past a flag indicating a closed beach.

At least two people warned him that a shark had been seen, but he strode into the water anyway.

Tracy Sassen, a former South African surf champion, watched as Mr Cohen was taken by the 3m great white only metres from the beach.

"I saw two swimmers in the sea, even though the beach ras closed,' she said. "I saw a burst of water and

# Recognition for lifesaver vest inspired by a tragedy

QUEENSCLIFF ironman Bird's death in a surf-ski accident on the Gold Coast was the catalyst for a lifejacket that could help revolutionise water safety

The designer of the self-inflating lifejacket, Chris Fox, was a member of the same surf club as Mr Bird, whose death at a Queensland competition last year raised questions about water safety.

awarded second place on Friday night at the 2011 Australian Design Award - James Dyson Award.

The creation by Mr Fox, a 23-yearold industrial design student from the University of NSW, monitors drops in oxygen levels, and automatically inflates so the user is brought into a safe upright position and can signal for help via GPS.

Mr Fox said the ironman's death had compelled him to design a lifejacket that could be incorporated into surf lifesaving competitions.

The whole reason this happened to him [Mr Bird] was [that] they couldn't find him because once he was knocked out he had no way of floating," he said.

## The jacket, called "9th life", was Safety move 15 years late

ALMOST 15 years after Australian Surf Lifesaving officials first considered trialling it, all competitors will wear bright flouro vests at this year's Aussie titles.

Boaties are agreeing even though it could cost crews thousands of dollars because the vests will cover the sponsors' logos.

The measures follow an investigation into the death of Oueenscliff ironman Saxon Bird last year, and the death of 15-year-old Robert Gatenby in 1996. An angry member of a surf website said the vests were "well and truly overdue"

Paul Pearce is the local State member. RCC is the Randwick City Council and their contribution amounted to \$430,000 plus landscaping.

At the official opening it was also announced that the NSW government had pledged another \$165,000 to assist the club repay its loans on this project & finance further work.

In his address the Mayor guaranteed that RCC would match this \$ for \$. (...and this work was completed last month.)

This feature is in no way meant to be critical of the club, the RCC or the State

Government. It is meant to show what can happen when all three players work together for a common purpose. \*\*\*\*\*\*
